Group 1-5 Questions

Group 1: Choose ONE of the following questions:

- Describe the setting in your book. How important is it to the story?
- Introduce the exposition: setting (time and place), characters, and intro to plot and conflict

Group 2: Choose ONE of the following questions:

- Who is the protagonist in your story and what type of conflict does your protagonist face?
- What is the main conflict in your book? How was this conflict resolved?
- What conflict was resolved in a way you don't agree with? Was it not realistic? Explain. How would you resolve that conflict?

Group 3: Choose ONE of the following questions:

- Is your character a static or dynamic character? Explain why he/she is a static or dynamic character by providing examples from the novel. (A static character stays the same from the beginning of the book to the end. A dynamic character changes over the course of the book).
- Describe the main character in your novel (do not include appearance). What are his/her faults? What are his/her strengths?
- What circumstances in your character's life cause them to act as they do?

Group 4: Choose ONE of the following questions:

- What was surprising or shocking in this book? Be specific. Give examples and the reason why you
 were surprised or shocked.
- Was there a word, phrase, situation, object, or idea repeated in your novel? What was it and why did the author keep bringing it up?
- What lesson about life did you learn from the book? State the lesson and explain the meaning using examples from the book.

Group 5: Choose ONE of the following questions:

- Why do you think the author chose the title for the book? Support your answer.
- Explain a situation that occurred in your novel that has happened in our world today. Describe each situation in detail.
- If you were to change one event in the novel, which event would you change and why? Be specific and give examples.
- Think of one quote that you really liked from the novel. Write that quote. Explain the significance of the quote.
